Burnham-on-Sea (Sue Newberry)

Burnham-on-Sea members have been knitting 'Bunnies' for the Women and Girls Charity in India.

Each Bunny is sold for £5 which enables the charity to purchase sustainable sanitary wear for one lady or girl for a year. 23% of girls drop out of school because of their periods and 70% of women cannot afford sanitary wear and 88% improvise using rags or even straw instead. We think nothing of periods in this country as sanitary wear is readily available, although now through the pandemic some girls are finding it very expensive and they also need help.

Periods are a very natural process for women and girls but if you cannot afford protection and also suffer the stigma caused by them in some countries, this becomes a real problem.

In October I received a call from one of our animal charities, Cat Protection. The lady knew I was an Inner Wheel member and cat lover and asked if I could go to a hamlet near Chard because a stray had been reported. Like many charities this year they were struggling to find volunteers and money to continue their work. Armed with my old microchip reader I set off down a narrow country lane and found a lovely barn conversion, one of 11 houses. Keeping social distance the lady of the house took me round the back into a beautiful garden. Explaining the cat had appeared about a week ago very hungry and frightened, she had asked all the neighbours but no one owned it.

Getting some food she called the cat and a beautiful young tortie came. This little girl was a dark tortie with a

white bib and paws. Seeing a stranger she hid again so I went and sat quietly near the food. Hunger overtook her fear and she came and ate the food, I gently stroked her and she responded (no feral cat this)

I scanned her but no microchip, she had been dumped by someone and was only 5-6 months old. After lots of cuddles (much to the resident cats disapproval) and with the assurance that food and shelter would be provided until one of the animal charities could take her in I left.

I was then contacted to ask if I could take her to the vets for a health check and neutering as place had been found for her, but joy oh joy when I contacted the people it was to find that a neighbour had seen her and fallen in love. This lady would give her a permanent home and take her to the vets and meet all the costs, there are some lovely people around.

Chelwood Bridge (Ros Anstey)

After starting knitting twiddlemuffs two or three years ago for people suffering with dementia members of the Club are still doing so. Grateful recipients have included Cholwell House Nursing Home near Temple Cloud and Stanton Court Care Home in Stanton Drew, and also included presenting several of these special muffs to the Village Agents when they first began making them.

At our latest meeting, when a few members met for coffee at Dobbies in Shepton Mallet, we brought along several twiddlemuffs and discussed where to take them. With no regular meetings allowed at the moment members decided to meet for coffee and talk about the club and what they were doing, in particular with the twiddlemuffs. It was decided to take the latest batch to Cholwell House Nursing Home.

We have also made some tiny teddies, which have been sent to Bristol Maternity Hospital for the new mums and babies. Another member is crocheting blankets. The twidddlemuffs will have to be left at the Nursing Home in their porch as they are not allowed to have any visitors because of the present regulations. They have said they are always very grateful for

these donations as the twiddlemuffs are very well received by some of their patients. We are hoping to have another get together in October as we think it is quite important to keep in touch during these difficult times, but also making sure we are keeping safe.

Shepton Mallet (Mollie Purse)





CHRISTMAS FRUIT CAKE

Ingredients

1 cup water 1 tsp salt 1 bottle whisky
1 cup sugar 1 tsp baking soda 2 cups dried fruit
4 large eggs 1 cup brown sugar Juice of 1 lemon
8 oz nuts



Method

Sample the whisky to check the quality. Take a large bowl. Check the whisky again. To be sure it is of the highest quality, pour one level cup and drink. Repeat. Turn on the electric mixer, beat one cup of butter in a large fluffy bowl.

Add 1 tsp sugar and beat again. Make sure the whisky is still okay. Cry another tup. Turn off the mixerer. Break two eggs and add to the bowl and chuck in the dried fruit. Mix on the turner. If the fried druit gets stuck in the beaterers, pry it loose with a drewscriver.

Sample the whisky to check for tonsisticity. Next sift two cups of salt. Or something. Who cares? Check the whisky. Now sift the lemon juice and strain your nuts. Add one table. Spoon. Of sugar or something. Whatever you can find.

Grease the oven. Turn the cake tine to 350 degrees. Don't forget to beat the turner. Throw the bowl out the window. Check the whisky again and go to bed.
